
Today: Respecting differences ... including theologies

Today, we tap into three books, three very different books to address that commitment... **Respecting differences ... including theologies**

The first book: The Day the Crayons Quit

The second book – the Holy Bible. Paul, in Ephesians 4:1-6; 15-16 speaks into our commitment focus for today


As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in allInstead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. + From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work



The third book: A Bigger table (Building messy, authentic and hopeful spiritual community). In this profound book, John Pavlovitz offers a different image:

the image ... the call to make ... to form a bigger table. Pavlovitz, a pastor, writer and speaker recalls how special meals at holiday time were in his home growing up in the States. People everywhere, they outgrew the kitchen table and graduated to the dining room table where in his words, new faces would appear, new connections made.

As we consider out theme of respecting differences, we need constant reminding and indeed encouragement from Jesus' who looked at relationships through the lens of welcome, whose table ministry was profound as he used the act of sharing a meal, the act for breaking bread, to let people know they were seen and heard and known and respected. Isn't that we aspire to at SSUC ... that everyone feels they are seen and heard and known and respected?



Says Pavlovitz:

Jesus models a better way. He fully engages all sides and teaches them about one another in the process. For him the table is a tool of connection. It transcends difference. It bridges disagreement. It declares the other welcomed and worthy of hearing ... This is the very heart of the bigger table... It's not about winning theological discussions or defending worldviews ... It is about tangibly living in a way that responds to what we believe about our own belovedness and about the belovedness of those we live alongside. It is about knowing and being known and trying to incarnate Jesus in our midst in the process and trusting God with whatever happens in the wake of that ... There is simply ... a real time, relational, intentional communing with others in redemptive community.

Pavlovitz reminds us that as we respect difference, we are able to see Christ in the other; including the other who is different in their outlook and their theology. For all of us, it's when we begin to see our discipleship as sitting with people and listening to their stories, respecting difference; being open to all will enrich, that we will build community in Christ together. Says Pavlovitz:

And once we view a person in the illuminating light of actual relationship, we can't help but see the God in them; we feel the presence of the divine; we welcome Jesus into our midst as we meet with them.
