Sermon notes

Jonah 3: RESPONSE

Response. That's our Jonah theme today.

The scriptures tell us, "The word of the LORD came to Jonah a second time." We all know what happened the first time. God said, "Get up and go to Nineveh" Go to Nineveh? You're kidding, God. So Jonah responds by running away ... away from God, then God responds - God sends a storm. You know the next bits, one response after the other. Finally, according to the scriptures, a huge fish spits out Jonah onto dry land.

SPEND SOME TIME READING JONAH – Chapter 3.

God speaks to Jonah a second time: "Up on your feet and on your way to the big city of Nineveh! Preach to them. They're in a bad way and I can't ignore it any longer." This time Jonah starts off straight for Nineveh, obeying God's orders to the letter. Different response completely ... Jonah obeys. He walks into the city, one day's journey AND preaches the shortest sermon ever recorded: "Forty days more, and Nineveh will be overthrown!" Possibly the most effective sermon ever preached. Immediately, the people of Nineveh – the whole city - believe God, The people declare a fast. The king orders human and animal alike to fast and put on sackcloth. Then all concerned, animals and people alike bellow out their repentance to God, and ultimately God changes God's mind about the punishment, and does not bring it about. Now, if that was my sermon I'd be over the moon. Mass conversion – humans, animals alike. But not Jonah. Jonahs' not ecstatic... he's mad

"Ah, LORD, is this not what I said would happen when I was still in my own territory? That's why I fled to Tarshish in the first place. Because I know that you are a God gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing." Here we have Jonah quoting those words we find time and time again in the Old Testament. Words that encapsulate the heart of God. BUT Jonah doesn't affirm these great words, it is an accusation. It's Jonah screaming,

You, God, are gracious and merciful. I declared your judgment on this sinful city, and you changed your mind! I love the way Kathryn Schifferdecker reflects on all this ... <u>http://www.workingpreacher.org/preaching.aspx?commentary_id=2347</u>

Here's the thing, you see, here's the thing all of us have found out about following the call of God in and through the waters: God is God and does not act as we think the Almighty should act. In good faith, we follow where we hear God's call ... we are prepared to bring God's word to that place, and what we find is that God is already there before us. We find that no people, and no place, not even Nineveh, can properly be called God-forsaken.

Poor Jonah. He just can't get a handle on who God really is. Can't come to grips that when God's true colours come shining through, God is indeed revealed as "God, gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love". (Psalm 86:15) He just doesn't get it. Isn't there a bit of Jonah in each of us. We have those we find difficult to love, who so rub us up the wrong way, who we really struggle to get on with, who we may well avoid. Remember ... God loves that person. God loves that person.

The same God who gives Jonah a second chance gives the people of Nineveh a second chance. How can we possibly begrudge that kind of mercy ... the mercy of God, gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love ... God we know most fully in Jesus Christ. Jesus died for that person. For them, for you, for me. God's love response. God, being mighty God could have said, "Enough" to our sinfulness, our waywardness, our arrogance, our turning our backs on God.

But in Jesus, God indeed says, "Enough" and so Jesus, gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love" dies out of obedience, out of love ... for our salvation ... for the hope of the world. The good news response. The love response. It's a response that calls from us, response. A response to share that response, in faith, hope, in joy, in love ... that as John 17 puts it that the world, just like ancient Nineveh might believe in God, who in Jesus, is "gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love." Let's make that our response, in the creative hand of God, the love of Jesus and the power and giftings of the Holy Spirit.
